A **Wollemi Pine** has been donated by Mrs Williams, Teacher Librarian. It had been given to her in a pot by her Aunt for her 50th birthday. It seemed appropriate to "release it to freedom" from the pot to the garden of our school now celebrating its own 50th. Mr Hutchinson, Mr O'Brien and many students kindly dug a very large hole to prepare for its arrival. As an 11ft tree it needed a child sized hole, and some thought they were digging to China! It went in the ground next to C block in Spring and looks very happy there shooting much new growth. It is hoped students will learn more about these "Dinosaur Plants" that were once thought to be extinct. It has been planted in memory of local horticulturist, Ms Elizabeth Williams who kindly donated her Herbarium to our school just before she died.

There are plaques at the base of these new plantings to explain their history. They were popular stops on the tours run by students on our Anniversary Open Days. We hope you get the time to enjoy visiting them and watch them grow.

I would like to wish everyone all the very best for the festive season and hope and pray that everyone has a safe and relaxing school holidays.



COUNCIL GOES BACK TO SCHOOL WITH MOSS VALE HIGH

Wingecarribee Shire Council has long supported a diverse workforce but a new objective is set to ensure our region's youth are provided with opportunities in the years ahead.

"For many years now we've heard the frustrations of our Shire's youth looking for meaningful full-time employment within the Southern Highlands," said Bronwyn Sutton, Council's Human Resources Business Partner.

"After leaving school, many want to stay in the area where they've grown up but a lack of employment opportunities forces many of them to look beyond our boundaries.

"As one of the Shire's major employers, we felt it was important we lead by example," Ms Sutton said.

Following discussions with Moss Vale High School, a unique partnership was subsequently formed whereby Wingecarribee Shire Council will support and train selected senior students wishing to undertake a trainee or apprenticeship whilst they complete their Higher School Certificate (HSC).

As a requirement of Vocational Education and Training courses offered in many HSC courses, participants must complete prerequisite training in order to graduate.

"Council understands that not all students want to go to university after school and we're also aware of how competitive the youth employment market is," Ms Sutton said. "This program has been designed to give young students the opportunity to develop their skills and give them the confidence to start a career - right here - at home in the Highlands."

Students undertaking the program will work part-time with Council throughout the duration of their final studies and once graduated from high school, will complete the remainder of their job training as a full-time apprentice or trainee.

Council is hopeful that under the program, younger employees under the age of 21 will make up at least five percent of its total workforce by the end of 2014.

"Through this partnership we're well on target to meet our objectives," Ms Sutton said.

"It may only be a small step, but we're confident that through partnerships like this, more school leavers will decide to stay, work and live right here in the Southern Highlands."

Activity Week 2013 Information for parents relating to water activities.


As you know, Activity Week takes place this year between 16 and 18 December. There are many activities that involve swimming or water related participation.

DEC guidelines, however, require students to pass a Water Challenge test before participating in water activities. This test will be held at the new Moss Vale pool on 10 December. It requires students to complete the following.

- Entry Slide in entry into shallow water and walk five metres.
 - (Please note: This is the minimum benchmark for yellow wrist banded students).
- Survival Swimming 25m swim with recognisable strokes.
- Survival Sequence Scull, float or tread water for 1 minute, call out for help once.
- **Exit** Exit the water unassisted.
- Rescue Sequence Demonstrate a simple voice rescue.

Following completion of 'The Challenge' all students will be classified as either proficient swimmers or non-proficient swimmers. Proficient swimmers will be issued with a blue wrist band and will be deemed safe to participate in the aquatic activity. Non-proficient students will be issued with a yellow wrist band and can participate in shallow water activities.

<u>Students must wear these bands for the duration of the water activity.</u> <u>Please note, this applies to all school excursions</u>

Improving Literacy and Numeracy National Partnership: Reading and Comprehension "Kick off with Reading"



The school year is nearly over and it has certainly been a busy and fruitful second semester.

Year 10

The Year 10 students completed a very successful work experience program at the end of term 2 and the reports from employers were all excellent. I must say that I am very impressed by the application, attitude and dedication that our students show when they are on work experience. By now all students should have completed the Student Pathway Survey, which helps them clarify their future career path. They should also have developed their Resume and have it stored either on their laptop or on a USB, please ask to see it and add any details that your young person may have omitted.

Year 12

Our Year 12's have completed their HSC and now await the outcome. These results will be released on Wednesday,18 December with those seeking an ATAR being notified of their scores on Thursday, 19 and Friday, 20 December. For those who made application for University places through UAC, the main round offers will be released on Thursday, 16 January. Quite a number of our students have already received early entry offers to UOW and University of Canberra, congratulations to these students. TAFE applications have opened and anyone who is interested in a course at TAFE should log onto the TAFE NSW or TAFE Illawarra web site. Two of our current yr 12 students, Sophie Abrahams and Amelia Rothwell have also been successful in gaining entry and scholarships to commence a first year university course during the 2013/14 summer holidays. This course will be studied at UOW Moss Vale campus and on completion will be credited towards the first year of their Bachelor of Arts degree at that university in 2015. Congratulations to both these students.

SBAT's

We have had some exciting developments in regards to the School Based Apprenticeship and Trainee Scheme (SBATs) in this semester, with the Wingecarribee Shire Council placing two apprentices, **Ben Coulter** (Automotive) and **Jacob Radovic** (Plumbing) and one trainee, **Melanie Fitzgerald** (Business Services). They have also conducted initial interviews and are planning to appoint another apprentice (Horticulture) and trainee (Water Services) in the new year. Further, in the last week we have placed two Community Pharmacy trainees with Moss Vale Community Pharmacy. The students who were signed to these traineeships were **Nadia Shaw** and **Nicholas Stanmore**. Congratulations to all of these students. We are also in the process of recruiting another student as a Financial Services trainee with the Commonwealth Bank. We would like to thank all of these employers for giving our students the opportunity to gain the valuable experience, expertise and qualifications that will come with these positions.

Next Year

In 2014 the school will be endeavouring to increase the number of SBATs that are available to our students. We have begun the process of identifying interested students and their areas of interest. This process will continue early in first term next year. With this scheme, students are signed up with an employer to do either an apprenticeship or traineeship, whilst completing their HSC.

Apprentices are contracted for four years and complete the first year of their apprenticeship (Certificate III or IV) by the end of Year 12. They then complete the rest of the apprenticeship after leaving school. For traineeships the students complete a Certificate II or III by the end of Year 12.

With both apprenticeships and traineeships, the student completes one day per week paid employment with the employer for a minimum of 100 days over Year 11 and 12 and also completes a theory component either at TAFE or school, depending on the course of study. These studies also count towards the HSC and may count towards an ATAR. To establish an SBAT the students need to find an employer who is prepared to employ them as a trainee or apprentice. Some of the employment areas covered by School Based Apprenticeships include: Automotive, Baking, Beauty Therapy, Cabinet Making, Construction, Cookery, Electrotechnology, Engineering (Electrical and Mechanical), Greenkeeping, Hairdressing, Horticulture, Jewellery Making Plumbing and Shopfitting. For Traineeships they include: Aged Care, Automotive, Baking, Beauty, Construction, Electrotechnology, Financial Services, Health Services, Hospitality, Horticulture, Metals and Engineering, Property Services (Real Estate) Sport and Recreation and Transport and Logistics. There are a number of financial incentives available for employers to assist in taking on SBATS.

Transition to Work Program

Another initiative which Moss Vale High School will once again implement for some students in Year 11 in 2014 is the Transition to Work Program. This follows an alternative curriculum and is aimed at developing skills which will assist these students in getting into the work force. Students in this program will, as part of their course, complete one day per week work experience in a chosen field based upon one or both of the Vocational Employment (VET) courses they are studying. These include: Hospitality, Construction, Automotive and Metals and Engineering. This program will also lead to the award of a HSC.

To enable these programs to run next year we will need to secure employers who are prepared to participate. If there are any parents or relatives who are also employers, have connections to employers or know of employers who may be interested in participating in either of these initiatives, we would love to hear from you. Student Access to Computer Devices 2014

As many of you may be aware the DEC funding for the Digital Education Revolution (DER) laptop rollout finished in 2013. Students will no longer receive a laptop when they start Year 9 from 2014.

In response to the completion of this program many state schools have begun the implementation of a Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) program. Students supply and maintain their own computer devices to assist with learning. Moss Vale High School is currently planning for the implementation of this program in the near future but have not yet finalised the documentation and recommendations for software that are essential for the program.

Students and parents who wish to purchase a device before the implementation of this program are given the following guidelines to get them started. Please note that the school has not formalised a policy for this program at this time and will require students to sign a policy document regarding the use of personal devices, to ensure responsible use of these devices in the school environment.

At this time we can provide the following advice regarding the type of device that could be purchased:

- 1. The DEC wireless standards installed at **Moss Vale High operates on the 802.11n 5GHz standard**. Devices with 802.11a/b/g or 802.11n 2.4GHz only, will **NOT be able to connect**
- 2. Battery life is recommended to be capable of lasting five (5) hours minimum of constant use.
- 3. **Device Hardware specifications** should, at the very least, meet the minimum specifications of the software and operating system that is intended to be used.
- 4. Smartphones, I-Pods or other handheld/palmtop size devices will not be acceptable in a classroom. Devices which connect to the Internet using a 3G or 4G connection will not be acceptable, students must connect to the Internet through the DEC wireless ports if using an electronic device in a learning environment.

Main requirement is a 5Ghz 802.11n wireless card. This is recommended as 3G / 4G connection would prove expensive and is not acceptable

IMPORTANT

According to the draft BYOD guidelines, the **DET will NOT be providing any hardware or software support**. It is therefore important to choose a device that the individual is familiar with and / or there is some support / warranty if needed.
