## **Principal's Report**

#### **Senior Students**

The HSC exams are well underway and students have commented that they have been quite happy with the exam papers. I look forward to catching up with our Year 12 students at their formal on November 10.

I have been impressed with our Year 11 students who have started their HSC courses this term in a conscientious manner. There have been a number of students who have carefully considered their current courses and have elected to drop a subject for the HSC. I would like to thank Mr Vandenbergh, Mr Warwick and Mrs Norris for taking a substantial amount of time to counsel and advise students with their decision making.

### **Cameron Clarson**

Congratulations to Cameron Clarson of Year 10 who was awarded a \$500 gift voucher for winning the Ingham Institute 'Pathways to Success' Science Poster competition. Cameron won this prestigious award and had the amazing opportunity to present his work in front of Australia's top scientists and medical researchers at the South Western Sydney Annual Research Showcase. The competition was part of celebrating National Science Week and Cameron demonstrated his outstanding skills and knowledge in the field of Science. We are very proud of Cameron and this impressive achievement.



#### Mobile phones at school

It is not a given right that students can use their mobile phones at school, it is a privilege at Moss Vale High School. In fact, there are many schools, both public and private that have a blanket ban on the use of mobile phones during school hours. Mr O'Brien and I have been dealing with a growing number of students who have used their phones during class time and for highly inappropriate purposes. I respectfully request that parents remind their child that phones are to be 'off and away' during class time, and that they are not to be used for sending offensive or inappropriate messages and images. Once a student breaches the school's agreement regarding mobile phones at school, then they forfeit the privilege of being able to use their phone at school at any time throughout the day.

#### **Positive Behaviour for Success (PBS)**

The PBS team is leading the school community in our current focus on social justice issues relating to gender inequality and violence against females. Firstly, we are involved in raising awareness of the serious issue of domestic violence within our own country where at least one woman dies each week at the hands of a partner or ex-partner. We want our students to not only be aware of this significant social problem, but we want our boys and girls to understand what constitutes positive and respectful relationships.

Secondly, we are re-visiting our highly successful fundraiser from 2015, the 'Do It in a Dress' day. This initiative is all about raising funds to educate girls in developing countries who would otherwise fail to receive an education and are often married off during childhood. On Friday, October 28, our school community will hold a mufti-day where staff and students will wear a school dress symbolically for the 60 million girls, or more, who are unable to wear a dress and attend school.

## **Acting Deputy Principal's Report**

### "Successful education is a positive partnership between the students, parents and the school"

Last term I raised concerns relating to the use of mobile phones within the school. Unfortunately, we are still having to deal with ongoing issues involving students and parents. I must reinforce that mobile phones are not a "right" at school, and there are clear Department of Education and school guidelines that have to be followed.

\*We continue to have students contacting parents and parents contacting students during school times about issues that legally should go through the front office and/or Deputy.

\*Students using mobile phones inappropriately in class which is genuinely impacting on their learning.

\*Students who refuse to follow the "Bring your own Device" agreement and argue with teachers when asked to "hand over their phone" which may result in a suspension for continued disobedience or a long suspension if they continue with refusal to follow the Deputy or Principal's reasonable request.

We will be discussing the issue of Mobile Phones at Moss Vale High School with staff next week and raise our concerns with the P&C . One outcome may be that MOBILE PHONES ARE BANNED AT MOSS VALE HIGH SCHOOL in 2017.

An additional concern is that of social media, in particular students and parents being unaware of the legal consequences of inappropriate transmissions.

Note, distributing pornography, violent acts or recording of persons without their permission or knowledge can lead to state and federal charges. As a school we have recommended legal action be taken against individuals. In schools, these criminal acts are dealt with under the Department of Education's Policy "Suspension and Expulsion of school Students Procedures" and in criminal actions this is a Long Suspension and potential police involvement.

In these areas we appeal for student and parent support to minimise the incidences of issues relating to mobile phones and social media.

Finally, we are now having many students in the senior years who are able to drive. This is a very exciting time for young people, however they must understand that they have significant responsibilities both when driving cars on the road and who they have travelling in cars.

The DoE makes it clear that students who drive to and from school can only transport siblings (or have genuine supported reasons to transport others on an irregular basis). As a school we have had to deal with the consequences of students who were involved in an accident without permission to be in the car! The right to drive to school may be removed or other consequences may be the outcome if a driver does not follow the expectations.

Class 9D was given the choice of five different tasks that show an understanding of what discrimination means, below is some of the work they produced.

## DISCRIMINATION TASK

As part of a task set to my class in PE, I chose to create and perform a monologue which demonstrated ways to affirm difference and diversity and encourage inclusion for all I wrote my monologue so it focussed on 'labels'; something I have noticed is very common in the world. I tried to write it in a way so it connects with the audience and makes them question themselves and their actions.

#### Labels

NOAH: [Sits at table with a labelling machine on it.] Let me ask you a question. What do you and this machine have in common? Any idea? The answer is simple: they both label things when they get the chance. We all know it shouldn't be the case, but at the same time, we all know it is. Subconsciously, we, as a society, label people without giving it a second thought. Everywhere we go, we can't help ourselves from thinking "she's black, he's white, she's fat, he's gay". It's true, isn't it? We feel the need to give other people a label. But why? Why do our minds always categorise people whenever the get the chance? Think about it. Give up? It's because we're taught to.

From a very young age, society makes sure that we know that people can't just be people; they need to be categorised. Don't believe me? Look at a newborn child. Newborn children don't put people into categories, they just acknowledge that people are people and differences don't matter. Now, the reason I'm saying this is to affirm difference and diversity, but I shouldn't have to be saying it at all. If society didn't tell us to categorise people, I wouldn't be sitting here, delivering this message, because none of us would know what the term 'label' means, let alone do it. I'd even go as far as to say that the term diversity wouldn't exist, because we wouldn't know anything different. We would only know that everyone's human. But the truth is, we know only the exact opposite. We only know to label people. Just try to walk down the street without labelling someone. Because no matter how hard you try, there's a very small chance you'll be able to do it.

And you might think that labels are not that big an issue, but if someone doesn't like a label that someone's given, the person is most likely to be discriminated against. And that's not a good thing. One in five people living in Australia has been a target of verbal racial abuse.

While women comprise roughly 46 per cent of all employees in Australia, they take home on average \$283.20 less than men each week. Gay lesbian, bisexual and transgender people are three times more likely to experience depression compared to the broader population. These statements are all factual. These statements all stem from labels. And, frankly, it sucks. There's no other way to put it. The world we live in can really suck. But it doesn't have to. Think about it. While all of us in this room have huge differences between us, we all share one common link.

[NOAH types the word 'human' into the labelling machine.] Human. We're all human, and that's really the only thing that matters. [Turns off labelling machine.] No more labels. We all need to accept each other as one thing and one thing only. Human. [NOAH puts 'human' label on his forehead.] Thank you.

If you haven't already prepaid for this year's Waratah magazine, there is still time.




